Sailboat & Windsurf Show 2002

So, let's see, it's 3:30pm on Monday 4 March. Hugh & Jean Stanistreet have just collected ST915 for it's trip back to Windermere and, short of putting a few thing's away, The Sailboat & Windsurf Show 2002 is over. It's been a long but quite successful weekend!

Mind you, last Wednesday I wasn't sure if we were even going to have a dinghy. On Tuesday the 915 boat was still in Fyne Boat Kits paint shop at Bowness-on-Windermere. The hull paint job had gone belly up a few days earlier. The temperature had gone from +5 to -3 over night and 915's Marlin Blue paint had not reacted well. It all had to be rubbed down and repainted. She came out on Tuesday night and arrived at Aquarius SC on Thursday. Having dropped the dinghy off and promising to pick it up again on Monday afternoon, Hugh and Jean then carried on to the Channel, a ferry, and Antwerp for the weekend.

I finally got into the Great Hall at Ally Pally at 12:30pm on Friday only to find a contractors lorry parked on our stand. Our pitch was in a row under the Rose Window and shared with the Graduate, Snipe, Gull and British Moth classes.

Steve Leeding, the ST Sailing Sec, arrived at 2:30pm. The lorry was moved by the stewards, and we set about building up the SigneT display. Steve had some really good display boards, a VDU display unit and the laptop to run the Power-Point based slide show.

We were a bit worried about rigging ST915. She was so new that apart from some basic fittings (i.e. shroud & stem head plates and genoa sheet sliding blocks) everything else had to be gleaned from elsewhere. She ended up with ST369's spars & standing rigging and ST858's sails. We were far from sure it was all going to fit, but fit it did and she looked great.

Probably the dinghy's best feature was the finish. The hull had been sheathed in epoxy, two coats inside and three outside. This had been rolled on, rubbed down and the inside and decks given five coats of varnish. The outer hull, as already mentioned, was painted in Marlin Blue. It looked like it had been sprayed on but Hugh assured me it was vertically hand painted. We finally got away at 5:30pm, straight out into the North Circular traffic. Oh frabduous joy!

Saturday was hectic! I've never seen so many people at the show. Many thanks to Steve & Johnathan Leeding, Frank and Joyce Cowern and Roy Melsom for all their help on the stand. We were all kept pretty busy. Despite protestations to the contrary Joyce came over 'all unnecessary' when Ben Ainsley wandered onto the stand and signed the Associations visitors book.

The stand seemed to have people on it most of the time including many friends who stopped by to admire the new Fyne Boat Kits dinghy. Several trade photographers also thought it worth a few exposures and flashed away to their hearts content.

Sunday was marginally less hectic but still very busy. Many thanks to Madeline & Keith Hatton, Jenny & Patrick Overs and Richard Cannon for all their help especially with packing up at the end. If you've never experienced an end of show 'tear down' I can't explain it to you. I can say however that it pays to have a really good team with you, and I had the best. Thanks guy's.

It would be most remiss of me not to thank Paul and Hugh Stanistreet, the co owners of Fyne Boat Kits, for the loan of ST915. The guys worked hard to get the boat ready and judging by the speed with which their handouts vanished off the show stand many people were very interested in Fyne's kits. And intrigued by their 'assisted build' option (i.e. build your SigneT in Fyne's spacious boathouse at Bowness and if you get in a pickle, or just need a second opinion, Paul or Hugh will sort you out).

I do feel however you might have a little difficulty convincing the wife that a week or two in a boathouse in Cumbria was preferable, in comparison with say, The Bahamas, The Maldives or even Bali!

Me, I settled for a 'half-way house'. Hugh's currently redecking Over Easy for me and Lyn's not even having to brush the sawdust of her shoes. Retail therapy in Windermere, Ambleside and Hawkshead apparently was far preferable and ensured she never had to get a whiff of marine ply or epoxy resin. Strange creatures women, why wouldn't they want to spend some time in a great boathouse with all it's atmosphere and smells!!!

Proposed Bridge at Sunnyside Reservoir (Hampton to Molesey) Eric BRIDGEwater

Members may have seen reports of a proposed pedestrian/cycle bridge at Sunnyside. We are very concerned about the impact this will have on us and have had a joint meeting of Hampton SC and Aquarius with the TOPS group. The main points made follow.

Around 1995 it was proposed that a pedestrian/cycle bridge crossing the Thames at Sunbury be studied. Out of these discussions a separate small un-affiliated group to be called Thames Overways Projects (TOPS) was born. TOPS expanded the objectives to consider 4 pedestrian/cycle bridges between Staines and Hampton Court. Meanwhile Spelthorne has built two Leisure Centres, which was good for Sunbury residents but removed one of reasons for the Sunbury crossing and therefore initial attention has turned to Sunnyside.

The engineering company Whitby-Bird & Partners were funded by Surrey and Richmond through SWELTRAC (set up to solve problems of surface access to Heathrow) to perform a feasibility study.

In the case of the Sunnyside crossing 3 sketches were produced and one proposal, Option 1, was fleshed out in a little more detail. No consultations with local organisations have been carried out. A press release was put out and an exhibition showing the results of the study is going the rounds (at Sunbury Library from 16Mar2002). A revised press release has been issued because of factual errors in the original but it appears that some papers are still using the old press release.

The two clubs were unable to discern from TOPS any valid argument for building a bridge at the Sunnyside location. Sunbury seemed to be the obvious location for such a bridge. Sunbury is halfway between Walton Bridge and Hampton Ferry, has a community living on one side of the river with desirable facilities and destinations on the other side and a developed infrastructure for the roads with lighting on both sides.

Some of our members living in Hampton pointed out differences from Sunbury. There is no riverside community at Sunnyside. Where Hampton comes close to the river there is already the ferry. There is no Civic Leisure centre in Molesey, which would be accessed by the proposed bridge. Molesey does not have the facilities of Walton.

It was clear that TOPs interest was in looking at the activities on the river but did not understand them. We need to emphasise to people that the bridge would destroy the sailing which is one of the key attractions to people on the towpath in this reach of the river.

The two sailing clubs would have their sailing reach, between Sunbury and Molesey Lock, cut in half by the proposed bridge. Aquarius Sailing Club boats would be trapped in their moorings in some conditions.

We pointed out that any bridge will affect airflow and will in certain conditions prevent sailing boats from moving upstream. A bridge with 10 metres headroom over nearly the whole width of the river would be required to allow the Aquarius and Hampton fleets to sail upstream and even then not in all conditions. The current proposal is for 5.9 metres over the middle part of the river


The two clubs advocated the relocation of the proposed bridge to an existing barrier such as Sunbury Weir. A crossing at that location would not hinder any river user and could be of much smaller scale.


It was clear that TOPs had much less support and much less time had gone into the proposals than conveyed by the publicity produced. We need to be aware of all comments made about the bridge. If anybody sees any comments like the following by Molesey Conservatives please let me know (020 8941 4135).

"Would you spend £2.5 million on a pedestrian and cycle bridge in Molesey? Surely this is the last item on most residents shopping lists, but is being given serious consideration. £2.5 million could be put to much better use."

SAILING SECRETARY REPORT 2001 - Richard Cannon

Last year was poor and unfortunately this year wasn't any better. We were unable sail for the first five Sundays due to the strong current and light winds; the first time this has happened since I joined the Club in 1992. The wind tended to be light during the middle of the season but improved towards the end.

The normal entry was only about 4 to 8 boats per race and the best was 11 boats at the Regatta and 10 boats on the last day of the season. A total of 39 people helmed or crewed in at least one race.

The Club boats were well used with generally 1 to 2 boats in use and on one occasions four club boats were out.

Our first sail was at a new event for us at Littleton SC. This was the Mid-Thames Trophy inter club event that was moved from Desborough SC, due to the current, at the last minute. Other clubs were Littleton, Desborough, Staines, and Laleham. We had 8 boats, the largest number of visitors. There were very good sailing conditions with 10-15knt wind and we did excellent to come 2nd to Littleton. A very enjoyable day.

We were very fortunate to have a good steady 5-10knt easterly wind for the two Open days; the first time we were able to sail on the river and conditions were ideal for taking around 32 visitors out. The safety boat was a joy to use with the new diesel engine.

There were the usual visits to Bewl for the Spring and August Bank Holiday weekends. The Spring Meeting was excellent sailing both days; hot, sunny and 7-15 knt winds. The August visit was one with extremes of conditions from zero to 30knts wind, in the same race. Sunday was much better

AQSC members supported all the SigneT Meetings and came away with the majority of the prizes. At the Signet National Championships Richard Cannon, with Robert Britton as crew won.

Bob Jones has supported many Skipper and Catapult meetings and has traveled away from the Club more than anyone.

As usual all trophies have been allocated to Personal Handicap results and this gives much closer Series results and usually helps spread the Trophies amongst the competitors instead of all going to one helm. Some results were very close with a tie for the Autumn PH result for the Cruiser Trophy that needed four levels of tie breaking.

I would welcome suggestions that might improve support for events. Am I giving members what they want? should racing be different times or days, too much or too little racing, alternative events. Please let me know so I have a chance to incorporate any suggestions in next year's program.

2001 PRIZES

The race series match those of last year and the same trophies have been awarded. Everyone who was 1st, 2nd, or 3rd for Boat Handicap or Personal Handicap result in a main series received a glass. Some glasses were also awarded for amount of sailing.

If a helm capsize or had any other incident or breakage would they please make sure it is recorded on the race sheet so it can be include in my result records. Brian Clements was awarded the Water Rat for 3 capsizes, in particular for being towed back capsized when he was determined to avoid getting wet..

Michael Stevens received the Young Helm Trophy; he continues to make very good progress, and at one point having the lowest PH and came 2nd on BH in the Summer and Autumn.

A total of 67 races on 25 days, including 14 Fun races, were sailed during the year; Bryan Clements and Graham Thompson were extremely keen to compete in 47 and 43 races respectively.

A printed report of each race entry, series results, summaries and other items are in the Race Result folder that is normally kept in the Club entrance. As the race entry reports are very compact and give virtually all the information (except intermediate lap times) on the original race entry sheets these will not be retained.

A Fyne Windermere Boat Another Fyne dinghy you got me into Stanley A Mighty Fyne SigneT

The latest addition to the SigneT fleet is ST915, as yet unnamed. She was built by Paul and Hugh Stanistreet who are the owners of Fyne Boat Kits at Bowness-on-Windermere. ST915, the prototype for Signet kits, was on our stand at Alexander Palace this year but because only the hull was ready she carried ST369's standing rigging and ST858's sails. A good team effort!

Lyn and I spent a few days up at Bowness recently to have a look at the dinghy. Her most notable features were that she is totally sheathed in epoxy and Hugh told me that he only used five screws in the whole construction! As we arrived she was just about to go into the paint shop. She will have a Marlin blue hull with varnished interior and decking. Hugh had some interesting suggestions re SigneT construction and will be taking these up with the class committee at the earliest opportunity.

Fyne plan to sail ST915 at our 2002 opens and the Rutland Water Nationals so you will have plenty of opportunity to take a look at her. Her helm is likely to be a colleague of Hughs called Paul Taylor. He's a sailing instructor based at Windermere.

Paul Stanistreet had suggested that I take Over Easy up so they could do some comparisons and take a look at her rigging and Paul Taylor was of course very keen to sail her. Everything started well. Windermere was very high with a fair chop and it was blowing about a four. I put Over Easy through her paces for a while and then handed over to Paul. He had been on the helm only a few minutes when unfortunately the rudder snapped off just below the stock.

Now given the conditions and that we were well out on the lake I might be forgiven for being a little worried. Steve just decided that it was a great opportunity to practice rudderless sailing and duly sailed us back to Fyne's boathouse as if it was nothing out of the ordinary. Yes, he knows what he's doing!

The Fyne facilities are interesting. They have a boathouse on the edge of the lake at the end of the lane that leads down to the Windermere car ferry. It's built into the bank with manufacturing facilities for smaller boats above and storage and repair facilities for larger boats underneath, including a slipway straight into the water. In the same area there are other boathouses that specialise in all aspects of wood and glass boat building and repair including paint and varnish shops.

Fyne had some amazing boats underneath including an 1803 Windermere sailing Yawl awaiting restoration. While I talked SigneT's and Sailboat 2002 with Paul and Hugh, Lyn, bless her little cotton socks, got on with some serious retail therapy in Bowness, Windermere and Hawkshead! She knows where her priorities lie!

If all goes to plan ST915 will be delivered 'down South' a few days before the show together with details about kit prices and build options that Fyne are keen to promote. Hugh was very upbeat about the epoxy sheathing which he was sure would solve many of the maintenance problems associated with wooden boat ownership.

After the show Fyne want to test and fine tune ST915 against other SigneT's and incorporate that information in subsequent dinghy's kits. Fyne's plans for the promotion of the SigneT are enthusiastic and refreshing and could give The Class a fresh lease of life.
