2002 Club Open Weekend

My crew, with the agility of a monkey, hung from the starboard shroud and the mast with his bottom three inches above the river. I managed to walk Over Easy sideways towards the safety boat where a number of helping hands grabbed the monkey and dragged him aboard. I kid you not, he never got wet, not even a little bit! However, not to be put off he got straight back in the dinghy and we had a great sail.

Our visitors this year seemed to be a bit more serious about the possibility of joining Aquarius. A number of 'singles' visited which is a little unusual. The youngest we took afloat, and have a go on the helm, was two and a half while the oldest was eighty-one! (we did have some fun and games getting him up & out of Richard's SigneT). We even had a family along from one of the moored cruisers that share our water-front. Several other visitors came across from the far bank in the safety boat. Hampton SC Regatta 15-16 June 2002 - Richard Cannon

The weather was ideal for the Hampton SC Regatta on Saturday and Sunday; dry and warm with a fairly steady SW 10-15 knt wind., at Hampton this gives a run down the river.

On Saturday Rodger Wheeler and Fin Gloyn, in the Club Graduate, Richard Cannon and Bob Gloyn in ST368 and Bryan Clempents in his Graduate were escorted to Hampton by the AQSC safety boat.

The main support at Hampton SC is for class racing with GP14 (8 entries), Merlin Rocket (11 entries), Enterprise (6 entries) and Laser (6 entries). Our boats entered the Handicap Class and the only other entries were a Byte and a Solo. Hampton SC have very simple courses with just an upstream and downstream mark taken to port; different classes use a different combination of marks; we used the nearest marks so didn't have to go past the islands.

Both races were excellent although Bryan, with out a crew, found it rather windy even without a jib and capsized on a gybe near the end of the first race; he didn't sail in the afternoon race. In the first race Rodger's sail was caught by a passing boat and the batons pulled out; fortunately it was the old sail and Rodger had the new sail with him for the rest of the races.

Room was found to leave our thee boats on the Hampton 'Island' so we didn't need to take them back to Aquarius overnight.

On Sunday we were joined by Mike Baker and Keith Hatton in ST369. The day was very similar to Saturday, except there were three races and a little bit less wind. Bob and Fin weren't available and Rodger found a couple of Hampton SC children who wanted to sail. Holly, a 8 year old girl, crewed for Richard and her younger brother, Jack, crewed for Rodger. Holly was very keen and half way through the first race asked if she could crew in the afternoon.

Although they only have a small handicap fleet the other classes were well supported and there were a lot of young families around.

An unusually few number of members made the trip to Bewl this year. It competed with the Jubilee celebrations, the forecast was for the weather to become wet, and there was no camping at the club. Although those who went could not have had better sailing.

On Saturday Richard Cannon took Robert Britton and his girl friend Carly with him with ST368, Laurie Bridges took ST856 and Barry Jones took his Hawk catamaran. The weather was perfect; sunny with a steady 10knt SE wind. Unfortunately only Richard's group were feeling fit to sail. The wind was coming down the 2 mile long Bewl Straight. Sailing three up the beat up and run back took just over an hour. The Hornets were holding an Open Meeting on Saturday and Sunday which helped make the water look busier than usual. The evening was spent having an excellent dinner at the Elephants Head.

The Sunday weather was similar but even hotter. Graham Thompson arrived with his wife Eiko and his Bosun. Rodger Wheeler came with the Club Graduate. We had Honorary Aquarius members with old Hawker friends Bill Poulton and John Dovey bringing an Enterprise.

Rather than join the normal Bewl Sunday racing we had another day cruising in perfect conditions. Barry's brother Bob joined him for sailing the Hawk, while Laurie and Rodger borrowed Graham's Bosun for a comfortable cruise. The boats ahead of Robert were a Flying Fifteen, a RS 200 and Lasers, so he had a very creditable place.

Unfortunately Richard found he had also left his cover behind and had to go back to Bewl on Tuesday to fetch them; it was a very wet but easy journey and the round trip took under 2 ½ hours. 08Apr2002 Cundy Long Distance Race - Richard Cannon

The Cundy Trophy is traditionally allocated to a long distance race. As a good sail away from our immediate reach requires suitable wind conditions, preferably a steady Easterly, it is not allocated a fixed date in the program but is sailed when conditions are suitable. It wasn't sailed in 1991 and 1992.

On Sunday 7 April 2002 it was fine with a 8-15knt Easterly wind, fairly steady by river standards. After the morning Fun race it was thought that the conditions would be good for a long distance race upstream. The Spring Series first race would also be for the Cundy Trophy.

As we didn't know what the conditions would be like upstream the plan was for the safety boat to lead the fleet running upstream and drop a mark when a suitable spot was reached for either one or two laps.

Charles Dennis spoilt the plan by running into some trees out of control. He jumped out but found the water was up to his neck; his second ducking of the day with out wearing wet gear. He had to capsize the Laser to get it out of the trees. After waiting for him to recover the safety boat was unable to catch up with the rest of the fleet.

Michael Stevens was leading and continued past Sunbury Lock as far as the Wilson Ferry; he sensibly used this as a turning line. His race time was 48 mins. Unfortunately this was 1:30min to long for him to win the Trophy.

Bryan Clements decided it was too windy to sail his Graduate with out a crew and Richard Cannon was delighted to be able to take him as crew in his Signet; they won the Trophy on Personal Handicap.

The second race in the afternoon, the SPA series race 1, was 2 laps using the channel sign post at the end of the next wider bit of river. This time it was Michael Stevens turn to run into the trees.

Surprisingly generally the wind was nicer upstream than downstream; it was less gusty. It was a great pleasure racing upstream almost as far as it is possible to go.

Although for various reasons there were only 4 boats out, the Club was busy with 16 members present to enjoy the delicious cakes provided by Linda Tillman and Magaret Tomkins

A New Look For Over Easy

My second trip up the M6 this year to Fyne Boat Kits at Windermere was tinged with a little apprehension. What sort of a job would Hugh have made of re-decking Over Easy? Replacing decks is never as straight forward as building new.

We arrived at Bowness late on Sunday 14 April. On Monday morning I left Lyn at the hotel and drove down to Fyne's boathouse. I was met outside by Hugh's brother Paul. He was sanding down a Mirror dinghy and appeared out of a blizzard of dust.

Paul explained that the dinghy was painted with a special, and very expensive, coating. It was rather like a paint mixed with a lot of talcum powder. It was pretty thick and sanded down to a near perfect finish. The downside appeared to be that to achieve this at least 75% of the coating was sanded off creating absolute clouds of choking dust. Strange thing is that Paul hates Mirror's, but I guess business is business!

Over Easy was inside the boathouse under the end window that looked out over the lake. She looked great. The new arrowhead decks were blond compared with the darker mahogany coloured interior. The contrast was pleasing and I was glad that Hugh hadn't stained the decks down. The surfaces were clear with only the port & starboard stay plates protruding through the decking. I resolved there and then to only put back those deck fittings absolutely necessary.

My thoughts were interrupted by two RAF Tornado jets hurtling past the window about thirty feet above the lake. Hugh and Paul didn't bat an eyelid, apparently this was an every day occurrence that had long since lost its novelty value.

The new decking had been epoxy coated inside and out and then finished with three coats of two pot varnish. Hugh pointed out that while the top was off he had made a couple of minor interior repairs concerning the interior transom pintle plates and the decking supports. The rest, he said, was in good condition given that the dinghy is over thirty years old. A game old bird with the young heart of a SigneT!

Later, back at the hotel, Lyn said she'd been shopping and that a local art gallery would be delivering a picture at 6:00pm. She explained it was a little to big to carry. An understatement if ever I heard one, it turned out to be over three feet square!

We towed Over Easy back down south on Tuesday the 16th and on Wednesday morning she went straight into the garage, which had been hastily converted into a temporary boathouse, for the interior and bottom to be stripped and repainted/varnished.!

Keith supplied a good idea which you might try sometime. I rigged two webbing ratchet straps from eyebolts set in the garage walls. These passed under the dinghy and raised her up off the launching trolley. She could then be easily rolled in the straps to any position required for work to be done. Simple and easy, nice one Keith!

To create the right conditions for varnishing (i.e. to overcome to cold and wet outside) I sealed the garage door with duck tape and set a fan heater working full time. Varnishing is now well advanced and I'm beginning to think about what fittings to put back and then getting Over Easy back in the wet stuff where she belongs.

Mid-Thames Trophy 2002

The first Club away visit of 2002 was to take part in the Mid-Thames Trophy event, hosted by Desborough SC this year, on Monday 6 May.

As Desborough SC is only a short trip upstream Bryan Clements with Michael Stevens towed three Graduate up there on Sunday with the safety boat. En route he took the opportunity to fill the safety boat with very low cost diesel at Shepperton Marina; it should last us for the season.

The Mid-Thames Trophy is an inter-club event between Desborough SC, Staines SC, Littleton SC, Aquarius SC and Hampton SC. with clubs taking turns to host it. As usual it was dominated by the host club with 10 boats, Aquarius did well to have 5 boats, Staines SC and Littleton SC each had 2 boats, Hampton SC was represented by their Commodore but no boat.

The Aquarius team was Mark Stevens and Robert Britton in a Grad, Rodger Wheeler and Fin Gloyn in the club Grad, Brian Clements and Peter Carpenter in a Grad, Richard Cannon and Bob Gloyn in a Signet, and Charles Dennis in a Laser.

Unfortunately the East wind, although the best for the Aquarius reac'h, was the worst direction for the Desborough reach. It was very light for the morning race and although stronger for the afternoon there was still no wind around the

first mark and each lap the fleet tended to collect there. It seemed even more fluky and variable than it usually is at Aquarius. The short course was 3 port hand marks.

One rule that differed to ours was that if a mark was touched it was re-rounded. With mark 1 this could mean that while you were trying to re-round the boats around you could complete a lap.

The fleet was split into two starts, one for fast and one for slow boats, to reduce congestion on the start line; the results for the two starts were combined.
