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COMMODORE'S REPORT

Firstly, welcome to all our new members. It's been an eventful quarter. We lost a much loved member in Maggie Rogers. Held the annual club open weekend. Went, ready to compete, in this year's Mid Thames Trophy, started a Wednesday afternoon series and our SigneTs kicked off their annual open series at Little Paxton, we sailed at Bewl Water during the late May Bank Holiday,and we held the annual regatta, Jazz night and barbecue.

The more observant of you might also have noticed that Bodgett & Son have also all but completed the extension at the upstream end of the club. Nice and homely as Aquarius SC is, it is in need of an amount of modernization, hopefully without changing its intrinsic character too much.

Last year we re-modelled the patio area, rebuilt the gallery floor, updated the bar area and addressed the club's electrical problems. The RYA Commodores Conference

This is always held on the first morning of the Dinghy Show in the Londesborough Room. It usually starts around 10:00am with registration and coffee and kicks off an hour later.

This year John Bagnall, the RYA's Marketing Manager welcomed everybody and outlined the agenda for the conference. He was followed by Dave Ritchie (National Sailing Coach) and Alan Oliver (Coach Development Manager) with a talk on 'Your club and the RYA'.

Edmund Whelan (RYA Legal & Government Affairs Manager) was up next to cover 'Club Officials and their Legal Liabilities'. This included some useful, and worrying, information about insurance for club officials and the new liquor licensing requirements for clubs shortly being introduced. These and other items replaced the earlier agenda item concerning risk assessment.

Sources of club funding was then covered by an external sponsorship consultant. This was very interesting and focused on sponsorship and what it can do for the sponsor and the sponsored. The perception is far removed from the reality. If you ever thought it was about being given loads of money for putting a few stickers on your boat, think again. The meeting ended with Jon White (RYA Windsurfing/Onboard Manager and Jenny Anderson (Head of the Maritime Leisure Research Group) at Southampton University talking about a national programme to recruit, retain, recognize and reward volunteers. John Bagnall then took questions from the floor. One item was about the RYA's growing concerns about entrapment under modern dinghies. This has result in fatalities because self bailing hulls have little or no air pockets when they invert and buoyancy aids make it difficult to dive down and out.

Although 'formal' by necessity these conferences are actually quite laid back and in addition to providing information to the delegates they are also a forum for Commodores from all over the country to meet and exchange experiences and ideas. Over a hundred and forty clubs were represented this year.

The RYA has worked hard to present itself as a much more user friendly organization and the success of our Olympic yachtsmen and women has helped this aim. As a result there is now a lot more Government money available to help fund many of their initiatives, such as 'Onboard'. All together a very worthwhile start to the 2004 Dinghy Show ... and the lunch wasn't bad either!

SigneT Open at Grafham Water 26 June 2004

Grafham Water can be pretty lively and is one of the largest inland sailing lakes in the UK. This open was incorporated within the Bedfordshire vs. Cambridgeshire 2004 Regatta.

Our SigneT's were entered under Paxton Lakes SC, just down the road (i.e. the A1) from Grafham. As such we sailed for the Cambridgeshire team, at least on paper, and the SigneT Open was calculated as a race within a race. Is this making sense?

Keith & Madeline Hatton and I left Stoneleigh, with Over Easy in tow, a little after 07:00 and headed off around the M25 to pick up the A1. When we arrived a couple of hours later quite a number of dinghies were already there including ST368 with Richard Cannon and his crew Robert.

For the purposes of the regatta the dinghies were split, by PYS, into fast & slow handicap fleets. The fast fleet had 33 boats while the slow had 45. Our SigneT's sail off 1265 so were of course in the slow fleet. Three one hour races were scheduled, one in the morning and a further two, back to back, in the afternoon. The fast fleet sailed well away to the left of the Grafham SC clubhouse so I'm not sure what type of course they sailed.

Our fleet sailed opposite the clubhouse around a trapezoidal course. This was made up of four marks, all to Port, plus a start and finish line set between marks four and one and formed by a committee boat and outer distance marker. This gate had to be gone through every lap; it was long for the mass start and shortened for the rest of the race. Throughout the day I suppose the wind was 3 gusting 4. The wind, blowing from the SW, pushing up bit of a swell on the water and generally it was overcast. The course turned out to be great. Every point of sailing was covered with the use of spinnakers possible on two, sometimes three, of the course legs.

We had a great sail. The only down point of the day was ST368 being hit by a Pico which left a small hole in her Starboard side. AQSC had two boats in the top three SigneT's home with ST369 coming 3rd and ST368 1st, so not a bad day!

Would members using club Laser's please take care when launching them over the bank. One of our recently repaired Laser's has been re-damaged because the bow overhang caught the edge of the wall and peeled the decking, in that area, off the hull. That boat cannot now be used, until it is repaired, because it's taking on water into the hull cavity.

Hampton SC Regatta

This year's Hampton SC's regatta was held over the weekend of 12-13 June, which also coincided with the clubs 60th Anniversary celebrations.

On Saturday four AQSC boats went down to Hampton. Maggie Futcher and her crew Pamela took their Enterprise. Richard Cannon and Damien Tubridy took ST368, Bryan Clements took his Graduate and Liz Archer and I took ST369.

We sailed in the handicap fleet along with a Solo, a Heron, Toppers, a Kinsman cruiser, and Comet Versas. Other class races were Merlin's, Lasers, GP14s, Enterprises and Thames Raters.

Five races were to be held over the two days with three to count. The conditions were far from ideal on Saturday. Even Hampton regulars said that the wind was coming from their worst direction and to make matters worse it swung through 180 degrees at the drop of a hat.

The courses were straight forward, two marks, both to port. At the end of Saturday ST368 was standing 3rd with ST369 4th

Bodgett & Son Go Back To Work

After a short Spring break Bodgett & Son resumed work at Aquarius on Wednesday 23 June.

The extension has now been fitted out with hanging facilities, shelving and a new cupboard to be used to store crockery, non perishable foodstuffs and kitchen equipment.

At the last committee meeting funding was also approved to complete the work in the gents changing room. This is to include replacing a section of flooring, dry lining the northeast corner walls and providing seating around two of the walls.

This will take the form of 15" metal lockers with seating above. The lockers are provided with keys and will be available later in the year to 'rent' on an annual basis. The intention being to provide

somewhere secure for member's private possessions while they are on the water. Two lockers will also be provided in the Ladies changing room. Hopefully this work shouldn't take too long.

In parallel work is also ongoing updating our external lighting both around the club, along the waterfront and in the car park areas. Internally Pete Carpenter has proposed the installation of a Cappuccino machine behind the bar. This idea was met with enthusiasm and will go ahead as soon as space is made available.

Apart from routine maintenance that will just about complete this years planned improvements. Future work will almost certainly include rebuilding the Bosun's store and refurbishment of the club's shower area.

Anti-Social Behaviour Concerns

Local concerns about Anti-Social behaviour in the Hampton, Sunbury and Molesey areas were aired at a meeting at Hampton SC on the evening of 28 June.

The gathering organised and chaired by Hampton SC, included Police Inspectors and Community Officers from both the Met and Surrey forces and representatives from local clubs, businesses, and resident associations.

The purpose was to brief the Police on the problems being encountered and decide on a course of action to combat them. Each representative was given the opportunity to outline their particular troubles; many were common, while others specific.

It became apparent that Hampton SC has far worse problems than our own with groups of youths regularly getting out to the club and using its roof as a diving board. It's now got so bad that the club has recommended to its members that no one should go to the club on their own or even in groups of two or three during the week.

Their roof has been damaged and several boats vandalized, although, to date, the club itself has not actually been broken into. Stone throwing and verbal abuse was another serious concern voiced.

Several businesses in the area, including the Hampton ferry, offices, boat yards and pubs reported vandalism and minor theft. I covered AQSC problems and made a useful contact at the Millennium boathouse which has its own problems, including a little known public right of way that goes clean through their property.

The Police then outlined their current strategy concerning youth disorder on both sides of the river. They stated that a number of gangs and individuals were known to them and that intelligence was being gathered in order to do something about them.

The use of ASBO's (Anti Social Behaviour Orders) was discussed along with a range of other actions that could be taken if suitable evidence could be assembled. This, the Police advised, was the single most important activity that the local community could contribute. They highlighted a recent case where four youths had been caught and charged at Hampton because a local resident had been able to photograph them in the act of vandalizing a waterfront property.

Contact points within the Police were another area of concern discussed together with late, or no, response. It was agreed that an information sheet would be prepared jointly between Hampton SC and the Met & Surrey Police detailing Police contacts telephone numbers, email address etc, that should be used to report anti social behaviour in the area, on either side of the river.

Both forces admitted that under manning and the lack of a marine capability was a problem, but they seemed genuinely anxious to engage with the riverside problems and urged everybody to start keeping 'incident logs', and where possible take video and still photography evidence.

Further meetings are planned in the future and I have offered Aquarius SC as an alternative venue to Hampton SC if needed.
